Virtual reality (VR) is no longer the future — it's already reshaping how we live, work, and learn. With VR headsets becoming more affordable and widely available, businesses and educators are exploring its potential to transform experience. In education, for example, VR simulations allow students to explore ancient cities or perform virtual science experiments, making learning more engaging.

However, concerns have been raised about the psychological effects of living in simulated environments.
