In her research, Duckworth defines grit as the combination of passion and perseverance applied toward long-term goals. It's not just about having an interest in something; it's about sustaining that interest and effort over years, despite failure, adversity, and plateaus in progress. Grit is the quality that makes a person stick with their future, day in, day out, not just for the week, not just for the month, but for years. Duckworth's studies have shown that grit is often a better predictor of achievement than talent. She observed West Point military cadets, National Spelling Bee contestants, and rookie teachers in tough schools, and in each case, those who had more grit were more likely to succeed, regardless of their initial talent or IQ scores. This is because while talent is a measure of how quickly your skills improve when you invest effort, grit is a measure of how much effort you are willing to invest. This concept is empowering because, unlike talent, which can seem like a fixed trait, grit is something that can be cultivated and developed through practice and mindset.
