1. Question Tags

What they are:

Question tags are short questions added to the end of a sentence. They're used to confirm information or invite agreement.

How they work:

- If the main sentence is positive, the tag is negative.
- If the main sentence is **negative**, the tag is **positive**.

Structure:

[Statement] + [auxiliary verb + subject pronoun]?

Examples:

- You're tired, aren't you?
- She doesn't eat meat, does she?
- They have finished the project, haven't they?

Why they matter:

They make conversations more interactive and polite. They're common in spoken English.

2. Wh-Questions

What they are:

Wh-questions ask for specific information. They begin with a question word like **Who, What, Where, When, Why, Which, How**.

Structure:

[Wh-word] + [auxiliary verb] + [subject] + [main verb]?

Examples:

- What are you doing?
- Where did she go?
- Why is he upset?
- **How** does this work?

Why they matter:

They help you ask for details, reasons, explanations, and descriptions. They're essential for interviews, research, and everyday conversation.

3. Historic Present

What it is:

The historic present is when we use **present tense verbs** to describe **past events**. It makes storytelling more vivid and dramatic — like the listener is experiencing it live.

Why it's used:

It brings energy and emotion to a story. It's common in spoken stories, novels, and personal narratives.

Examples:

- So I walk into the room, and everyone stares at me.
- He opens the door, and there she is waiting.
- Suddenly, the lion **jumps** out of the bushes!

Compare with normal past tense:

- Past tense: I walked into the room, and everyone stared.
- Historic present: I walk into the room, and everyone stares.

Why it matters:

It helps you become a better storyteller and adds life to your writing.
