 - T'm going to study medicine next year.
- 2. Predictions based on present evidence (we can see that something will happen).

Negative form:

Subject + am/is/are not + going to + base verb

He isn't going to watch the movie.

Question form:

Am/Is/Are + subject + going to + base verb?

- Are you going to come tonight?
- What are you going to do this weekend?

- I'm going to call my friend after class.
- She's going to bake a cake for her birthday.
- We're not going to go out tonight.
- Are they going to play football tomorrow?
- Look! He's going to fall off his bike!

The modal verb "should" is used to give advice, suggestions, opinions, or to express what is the right or best thing to do.

We use should to say that something is a good idea or the right thing.

♦ Structure

- Note: The verb after *should* is always in the **base form** (no *to*).
- You should go now.

A compound adjective is made up of two or more words joined together (usually with a hyphen) that work as one adjective to describe a noun.

- A well-known actor
- A high-speed train
- A part-time job

Compound adjectives help make descriptions more precise and interesting.

O Remember:

- Use a hyphen (-) between the words when they come before the noun.
 - She has a well-paid job.
- X Don't use a hyphen when the adjective comes after the noun.
 - Her job is well paid.

• She's a **hard-working** student.

He's a **kind-hearted** person.

It's a mouth-watering meal.

We stayed in a four-star hotel.

7. Participles as Adjectives

Explanation

Participles are verb forms (usually ending in -ing or -ed) that can function as adjectives to describe nouns or pronouns.

There are two main types:

- 1. Present participles → end in -ing
 - Properties Describe how something causes a feeling.
 - ➤ The movie was interesting. (= The movie caused interest.)
- 2. Past participles → usually end in -ed
 - Describe how someone feels about something.
 - ➤ I was interested in the movie. (= I felt interest.)

♦ Structure

Present participle	verb + ing	The game is exciting.	(It causes excitement)
Past participle	verb + ed	We are excited about the game.	(We feel excitement)

Remember:

- -ing adjectives describe the thing or situation.
- -ed adjectives describe how people feel.

Examples

- The lecture was **boring**.
- The students were **bored**.
- I saw a **frightening** movie last night.
- She was **frightened** by the noise.
- This is a **confusing** question.
- I'm **confused** about the answer.

8. Compound Nouns

Explanation

A compound noun is made up of **two or more words that function as one noun**. Compound nouns can be written in three ways:

- 1. Closed form → words are joined together
 - toothpaste, bedroom, notebook
- 2. **Hyphenated form** → words are joined with a hyphen (-)
 - mother-in-law, check-in, sister-in-law
- 3. Open form → words are written separately but used together
 - post office, swimming pool, bus stop

Purpose: Compound nouns create specific meanings and make sentences more concise.

Noun + Noun	toothbrush	a brush for teeth
Adjective + Noun	blackboard	a board that is black
Verb + Noun	swimming pool	a pool for swimming
Noun + Verb	rainfall	amount of rain
Noun + Preposition + Noun	mother-in-law	your spouse's mother
Number + Noun	ten-speed bike	bike with ten gears

Remember

- The first word often describes the second word.
- The compound noun acts as a single noun in the sentence

Examples

- I need a new notebook for school.
- He bought a toothbrush and toothpaste.
- My mother-in-law is visiting us.

- We meet at the bus stop
- There's a swimming pool in our hotel.
- She works in a post office.
