How to get the full mark while answering this question

Tips:

1. Understand the Task

So you need to:

- Identify **the two opposing or different perspectives**.
- Summarize **each one in 2 statements**.
- Explain **how the author supported each** (by example, explanation, or evidence).
- Write in **one short, academic paragraph**.

2. Structure to Follow (Template)

Use this clear academic structure:

Sentence 1–2: Introduce the first point of view and its supporting evidence.

Sentence 3–4: Present the second point of view and how the author supports it.

3. Useful Academic Phrases

You can use these in **any summarizing or discussion question**:

5. Academic Techniques to Apply in Any Topic

- **Paraphrase** (don't copy phrases from the text).
- **Condense ideas** (keep only the main point + evidence).
- **Use connectors** (e.g., "In contrast," "For example," "However").
- **Be objective** (no personal opinion).
- **Balance both sides** equally.

Reusable Academic Writing Frame (Two Points of View Summary)**Sentence 1 – Introduce the topic**

The text discusses different opinions about **(main topic)** and explains how each side views it.

Sentence 2 – Present the first point of view

One point of view suggests that **(summarize the first idea)**. The author supports this claim by **(mentioning / giving examples of / explaining that) (evidence or example)**.

Sentence 3 – Present the second point of view

In contrast, another perspective argues that **(summarize the second idea)**.

This idea is supported by **(examples, reasons, or evidence)** that show **(explain briefly)**.

Sentence 4 – Optional conclusion or balance

Part 1

People considered "right-brained" are usually described as artistic, emotional, and strong at visual or musical expression. For instance, painters, musicians, and designers might rely heavily on their right-brain skills. This view emphasizes the importance of creativity and innovation in making life enjoyable and meaningful. However, many scientists today argue that the two sides of the brain actually work together more than separately. Still, the theory remains popular in everyday conversations, especially when people describe their strengths or learning styles.
