Elon Musk is an entrepreneur and businessman from South Africa. Some of the companies that he founded include PayPal, SpaceX, and Tesla Motors. As of January 2021, Musk is the wealthiest man in the world.

Musk was born on June 28, 1971, in Pretoria, South Africa. His parents divorced when he was only 10, and to escape from his unstable life he became interested in computers and software. He taught himself how to create his own software and when he was 12 years old he sold his first software - a game he created called Blaster. Musk was also interested in karate and wrestling. When he was 17 years old, he moved to Canada to attend Queen’s University. Another reason he left South Africa was to avoid mandatory service in the South African military. Musk became a Canadian citizen that same year because he felt like it would be easier for him to become an American citizen as a Canadian than as a South African.

Musk eventually earned a degree in economics and physics in 1992. After this, the Internet Boom occurred, and Musk began building his internet businesses. In 1999 PayPal was created as a way to send and receive money digitally. This made shopping for goods and services much easier than they had been in the past. In 2002, Musk and other investors sold PayPal for more than a billion dollars. In 2004, Musk invested in Tesla, an electric car company, and eventually became its co-founder and CEO. Today, Tesla is well known throughout the world for its innovative technology and is one of the world’s most valuable companies.

In 2002, Musk founded SpaceX. The mission of the company was to build spacecraft for commercial space travel. In less than six years, NASA presented SpaceX with a contract to transport cargo to and from the International Space Station (ISS). In 2012, Musk and SpaceX launched the Falcon 9 rocket into space and toward the ISS with 1,000 pounds of supplies for the astronauts living there. This made history because this was the first time a private company sent any goods to the ISS.

Since then, SpaceX has been in charge of sending supplies, people, and satellites into space. Commercial spaceflight has been propelled into the future by a billionaire that began his career as a kid playing games on his personal computer.

Reading Passage 5

Money is one of the most important inventions in human history. It helps people who do not know or trust each other to trade. If you have enough money, you can go into a store and walk out with a candy bar. The store owner does not need to know or trust you. They only need to count your money. This is a pretty big deal if you think about it.

Before money, most exchange was based on credit and debt. Imagine that you were part of an ancient tribe and had an extra pair of shoes. If your tribe mate Joshua needed shoes, you might give him your extra ones. Joshua would then be in debt to you. He would owe you one. Later, your family might be starving in the depths of winter. You might have no success hunting, and Joshua might share some of his food with you.

The credit and debt system served humans well for much of time. Our minds are good at remembering favors and who owes whom. The problem with this system is that it requires trust. I need to know the reputation of the person to whom I am lending. I need to trust that he or she will repay me. Otherwise, we cannot trade. It's easy to trust our tribe mate Joshua. We know him. We are familiar with his reputation. But what about those from the tribe across the sea? Do we trust them? Probably not. At least not enough to give them our shoes on credit. After all, we don't even know them.

A society that does not have money cannot grow very large. It's hard to maintain relationships with more than 150 or 200 people. Reputational systems of exchange fail as groups grow larger. The need for money develops.

Imagine that you were a soldier living in a Roman army camp in the 1st century. Thousands of men and women live alongside you. Many are soldiers. Some are nurses or physicians. Others are merchants, farmers, or cooks. Let's say that you needed a blacksmith to repair your armor. The blacksmith doesn't know you. Even if he or she did, you might die in the next battle. The blacksmith cannot trust you to repay your debts. But the blacksmith does not need to trust you. You are paid in gold and silver coins. You can trade coins with strangers for whatever goods or services you desire.

Today, the monetary system once again relies on credits and debts. But now, banks and lenders can keep track of everyone's reputation. They use computers and government issued identities. They know our credit histories. They know our spending habits. They use algorithms to rank our credit worthiness. They know us well enough to issue credit to us, even though they don't actually know us. What a world!

That's because there's enormous interest in these competitions: games such as *League of Legends* and *Fortnite* run huge tournaments, watched by hundreds of millions of people online around the world.

But guess what? If you want in on the world of esports, you don't have to be a top-flight gamer. In fact, you don't have to be a gamer at all! The field offers careers in sales, marketing, management, coaching, computer programming, event planning—even social media. The industry even has part-time jobs for 17-year-olds.

Just How Big Are Esports?

With revenue three times as big as the global movie industry—\$152.1 billion and counting—computer games have long dominated the entertainment world. The esports business has been growing right alongside them and will soon break the billion-dollar mark on its own.

Just as in “real life” sport franchises like the NFL or NBA, esports teams select their players through a draft. Prize money for franchises like EA's *Madden* can run into many millions of dollars, money that's split by the winning teams.

With all the attention and money, it makes sense that college students can now major in playing video games. More than 50 colleges offer varsity esports programs with scholarships. The National Association for Collegiate Esports (NACE) provides thousands of dollars in college scholarships, given to the winners of their tournaments.

A Wide Range of Work Opportunities

But the beauty is, you don't have to major in esports to get a job in the industry. This quickly expanding industry has jobs to fill—lots of them—and most of these slots are *not* for gamers. In fact, in 2018 there were

more than 2,400 openings posted on an esports job board. These postings ranged from ground-level opportunities to top-level, full-time executive positions.

No need to have talent with a controller; an interest in developing and promoting new technology could easily land you a job in the industry. Alternatively, you may want to become a recruiter—discovering new talent in gaming or game creation. Esports organizations also need sales and marketing professionals to find and convince companies to sponsor tournaments. Or you may want to get involved in game development: what could be more thrilling than to help create a game that no one's ever played and see it become an international hit?

All over the gaming world, esports contenders fight virtual battles for ever-greater prizes, seizing glory or going down in defeat before audiences the size of small cities. All these players are doing something they love, and they're getting paid and respected for it. But you could find *yourself* in that world, too, sharing in the thrill of the game while earning a living. Majoring in esports in college could be your ticket, but so could studying any of the fields mentioned above. In an era of virtual participation and worldwide communications, the expanding industry of esports seems destined for an ever-greater role in the world of sport.

Grammar Point Two: Can and Should

CAN

The verb "can" has one form for all singulars and plurals and occurs only in the present tense. It does not require the use of any additional auxiliary verb, as the questions are formed through the inversion, and negatives through the addition of the word "not."

The full form of negative form is written jointly: **can + not = cannot.**

After "can" we put an infinitive without a "to."

We use this verb to express that something is possible or impossible:

affirmative sentence	Fast driving can be very dangerous.
interrogative sentence	Can smoking be good for your health?
negative sentence	He can't be home already. I saw him in town five minutes ago.

We use this verb to determine someone's abilities and skills:

affirmative sentence	She can speak French and Spanish.
interrogative sentence	Can you run fast?
negative sentence	I can't drive .

SHOULD

The modal verb "should" express advice. It is also used when speaking of what seems appropriate in a given situation:

Example:

You look so pale. You **should** see a doctor.

I think I **should** look for a better job.

The verb that follows "should" is in an infinitive without to:

affirmative sentence	You should visit them one day.
interrogative sentence	When should I start ?
negative sentence	You shouldn't believe everything you see on the Internet.

Grammar Point Three: Reported Speech:

Meaning

Reported speech is a way to tell someone what someone else said. Instead of repeating the exact words, you say what they said in your own words. For example, your friend, Ali, says, "I am going to the cinema." Later that day, you want to tell another friend what Ali said so you say, "Ali said he was going to the cinema."

Form – Reported Statements

1. When we report what someone said, we often use a tense which is 'further back' in the past than the original tense used.

Direct speech (original statement): "I **want** some water."

Reported speech: He said he **wanted** some water.

This is because we are generally reporting on a past event. The table below shows the changes in tense. Note that when the direct speech is in the past perfect, we don't make any changes. This is because we can't go further back than the past perfect.

- If what the speaker said is still true or relevant, we don't need to change the tense:

Direct speech: *"I've **hurt** my leg."*

Reported speech: *She said she **has hurt** her leg, so she won't be at work today.*

- We can use 'that' after the reporting verb

*He said **that** he wanted some water.*

*She told me **that** she has hurt her leg, so she won't be at work today.*

2. We also need to make changes to pronouns when using reported speech if we are reporting what someone else said:

Direct speech: *"**I** want some water."*

Reported speech: *He said **he** wanted some water.*

Direct speech: *"**We** can't come to the meeting."*

Reported speech: *They said **they** couldn't come to the meeting.*

- If we are the person or the one who spoke, the pronouns don't change:

Direct speech: *"I'm working at home today."*

Reported speech: *I said I was working at home today.*

3. Sometimes, we need to make changes to demonstratives and adverbs of time and place if they are no longer appropriate:

Direct speech: *"This is my house."*

Reported speech: *He said this is his house. (You are currently in front of the house.)*

Reported speech: *He said that was his house. (You are not currently in front of the house.)*

Direct speech: *"I'll do it today."*

Reported speech: *He said he'll do it today. (It is currently the same day.)*

Reported speech: *He said he would do it that day. (It is not the same day.)*

Direct speech: *"It's so nice here."*

Reported speech: *She said it is so nice here. (You are currently in the place she likes.)*

Reported speech: *She said it was so nice there. (You are not currently in the place she likes.)*

The table below shows some more examples of changes to demonstratives and adverbs of time and place:

Direct speech	Reported speech

Form – Reported Questions

Similarly, we can report questions. If your friend, Aisha, asks, *"What are you doing at the weekend?"*, you can tell someone else what Aisha asked you by saying, *"She asked me what I was doing at the weekend."*

1. Change the pronouns, tense, demonstratives, and adverbs of time and place as in reported statements.
2. Change the word order: in reported questions, we usually change the word order. We put the subject (the person or thing) before the verb – just like in a normal sentence:

Direct speech: *"Where are you going?"*

Reported question: *He asked him where he was going.* ✓

He asked him where was he going. ✗

3. **Yes/no questions:** we use *if* or *whether* to report the question. '*If*' is more common.

Direct question: *"Are you going to work?"*

Reported question: *He asked me if I was going to work.*

He asked me whether I was going to work.

4. **Wh- questions:** in what, where, why, who, which, when, and how questions, we use the question word to report the question.

Direct speech: "**Where** did you go?"

Reported question: *She asked us **where** we had gone.*

Direct speech: "**Why** are you studying chemistry?"

Reported question: *He asked her **why** she was studying chemistry.*

5. **Choice questions:** reported questions which offer a choice follow the same structure as yes/no questions, but 'whether' is more common.

Direct speech: "*Do you want tea or coffee?*"

Reported question: *He asked me whether I wanted tea or coffee.*

Direct speech: "*Is she Australian or American.*"

Reported question: *She asked her whether she was Australian or American.*

- **Remember!** Don't use question marks in reported questions.

Form – Reporting Verbs

We use a range of reporting verbs in reported speech. This allows us to accurately, effectively, and clearly convey the thoughts, words, and emotions of the original speaker.

Direct speech: "*I made a mistake.*"

Reported statement: *He **admitted** he had made a mistake.*

Direct speech: "*What time is the meeting?*"

Reported question: *He **enquired** about the time of the meeting.*
