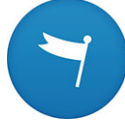

Overview

The Cycle 1 English Language School-based Summative Assessment should be designed to reflect the Structured Literacy approach outlined in the curriculum, ensuring systematic coverage of Literacy Readiness, Reading and Writing. Assessments should provide students with clear opportunities to demonstrate phonological awareness, foundational decoding skills, and early vocabulary development, all of which are central to the progression of skilled reading.

In addition, the tasks should reflect the integrated nature of language learning in Cycle 1 by drawing on age-appropriate texts, meaningful contexts, and familiar classroom themes. This ensures that students are assessed on what they have been explicitly taught, while also allowing them to apply their emerging skills in authentic ways.

This document provides sample test specifications intended to support teachers in the design of Term 3 School-based Summative Assessments. The specifications are provided for guidance purposes only and are not mandatory. Teachers may adapt, amend, or replace the sample tasks as appropriate to meet the needs of their students. Teachers are free to select themes and contexts covered during Term 3, provided that all assessment tasks remain aligned with the relevant Student Learning Outcomes.

Structure

School-based – Grades 3 and 4

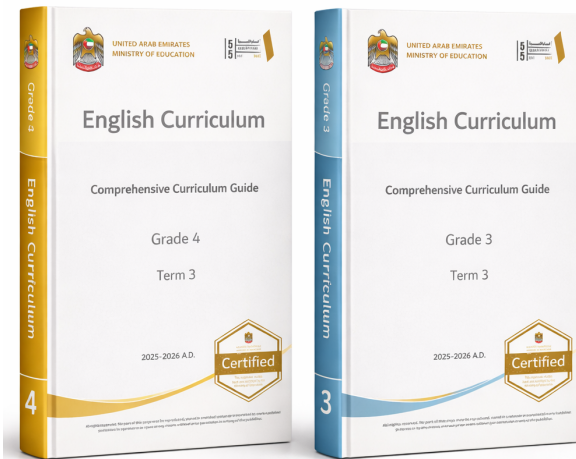
The suggested structure is as follows:

- **Part 1 - Vocabulary:** Assesses skills at Mastery level
- **Part 2A - Reading:** Targets working towards Mastery and working at Mastery
- **Part 2B - Reading:** Targets working at Mastery and Mastery with Greater Depth
- **Part 3 - Writing:** Assesses student writing ability at Mastery level



Curriculum Alignment

The suggested specifications align with the curriculum, and teachers are encouraged to use the sample test specifications as a guide when selecting themes. The Cycle 1 English curriculum is built around age-appropriate, meaningful themes that help students understand themselves, their communities, and the wider world. Using the themes outlined in the sample specs ensures that assessments reflect these authentic contexts and support the intended development of reading and writing skills.

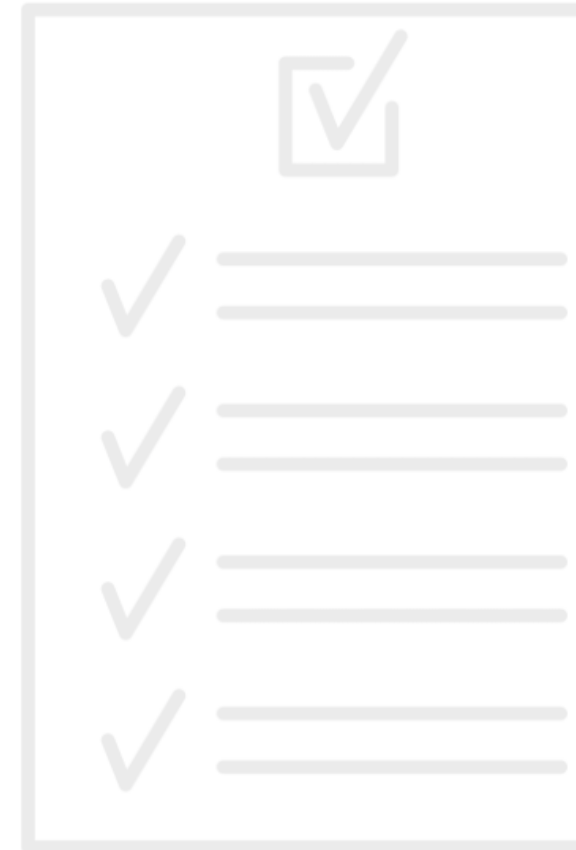
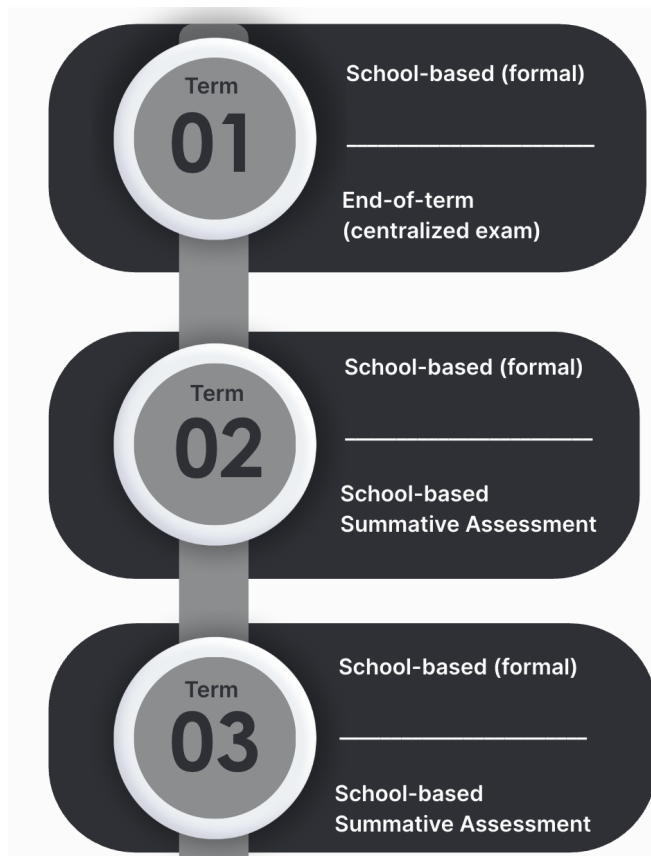


In Grade 3 Term 3, the units *"Time"* and *"Green Living"* guide learners to understand how daily choices shape their lives and their environment. Across eight sub-themes, students explore telling time, daily routines, hobbies, money, technology use, past experiences and environmental responsibility. Through these real-life contexts, learners strengthen their language skills by asking and answering questions, describing habits, explaining reasons and recounting events.

In Grade 4 Term 3, the theme *"Global Connections"* explores how people, cultures and ideas are linked across the world through six connected sub-themes that invite learners to compare traditions, describe experiences and express opinions. The topics encourage students to communicate confidently, think critically and reflect on their role in an interconnected global community.
