(1) Zero conditional

Usage:

We use Zero Conditional when **the result of the condition is always true, like a scientific fact.** It expresses things that **always happen** under certain conditions.

Structure:

If	condition	result
	present simple	present simple

Examples:

- If you **heat** water to 100°C, it **boils**.
- The grass **gets** wet if it **rains**.
- If you **mix** red and blue, you **get** purple
- If people **don't eat**, they get hungry.
- I **go** to bed early if I **feel** tired.

Notice that we are thinking about a result that is always true for this condition. The result of the condition is an absolute certainty. The important thing about the zero conditional is that the condition always has the same result.

(2) Comparatives and Superlatives

Definition

Comparatives and **superlatives** are forms of adjectives (and some adverbs) used to **compare people, things, or actions**.

- **Comparative** → compares **two things**
- **Superlative** → compares **three or more things**

1 Comparatives

Form:

- For short adjectives (one syllable): add **-er**
 - tall → taller
 - fast → faster
- For adjectives ending in **-y**: change **y** → **i** + **-er**
 - happy → happier
 - easy → easier
- For longer adjectives (two or more syllables): use **more + adjective**
 - beautiful → more beautiful
 - expensive → more expensive

Usage:

- Compare **two things**:
 - Ali is taller than Omar.
 - This book is more interesting than that one.

2 Superlatives

Form:

- For short adjectives (one syllable): add **-est**
 - tall → tallest
 - fast → fastest
- For adjectives ending in **-y**: change **y** → **i** + **-est**
 - happy → happiest
 - easy → easiest
- For longer adjectives: use **the most + adjective**
 - beautiful → the most beautiful
 - expensive → the most expensive

Usage:

- Compare **three or more things**:
 - Omar is the tallest in the class.
 - This is the most interesting book I have ever read.

3 Irregular Comparatives and Superlatives

Adjective	Comparative	Superlative
good	better	best

Examples:

- This pizza is better than that one.
- He is the best player on the team

(3) Modal Verbs (should/could)

Definition

Modal verbs are special verbs that express **ability, possibility, necessity, or advice**.

- **Should** → gives advice, suggestions, or expresses obligation.
- **Could** → expresses ability or possibility, often in a polite or hypothetical way.

1 Should

Usage:

- To give advice or recommendations
- To talk about duties or obligations
- To suggest what is the right thing to do

Structure:

Subject + should + base verb

Examples:

- You should study for your exams. (advice)
- We should be polite to our teachers. (obligation / recommendation)
- He should see a doctor if he is sick.

Negative Form:

- Subject + **should not / shouldn't** + base verb
- Example: You **shouldn't** eat too much junk food.

2 Could

Usage:

- To express **past ability** (like “was able to”)
- To express **polite possibility or permission**
- To talk about **hypothetical situations**

Structure:

Subject + could + base verb

Examples:

- I could swim when I was five. (past ability)
- You could ask your teacher for help. (polite suggestion / possibility)
- If you study hard, you could pass the exam. (hypothetical)

Negative Form:

- Subject + **could not / couldn't** + base verb
- Example: He **couldn't** come to the party yesterday.

Use **take** for:

- Actions involving movement or time
- Receiving or accepting something

✓ Examples:

- take a photo
- take a break
- take a shower
- take care
- take a seat
- take notes
- take your time
- take responsibility

Have

Use **have** for:

- Experiences, relationships, or possessions
- Food and drink

✓ Examples:

- have a good time
- have a rest
- have lunch
- have a problem
- have a conversation
- have fun

(5) Expressing Purpose

(in order to / to + verb (infinitive))

1. Explanation

We use “**to**” or “**in order to**” to **explain why** someone does something — the **purpose** of an action.

Both structures are followed by the **base form of the verb (infinitive)**.

✓ Structure:

Subject + verb + (in order) to + base verb

2. Usage

A. To + Verb

- Used to show purpose in everyday situations.
- It's more common and shorter.

Examples:

- She studies hard **to pass** her exams.
- I went to the store **to buy** some milk.
- He got up early **to catch** the bus.

B. In Order To + Verb

- Has the same meaning as “to,” but is **more formal**.
- Often used in writing or when we want to **emphasize** the purpose.

Examples:

- She left early **in order to** arrive on time.
- We turned off the lights **in order to** save energy.
- He spoke slowly **in order to** be understood.

3. Negative Form

To express a **negative purpose**, use: **in order not to** or **so as not to**

Examples:

- He whispered **so as not to wake** the baby.
- I left early **in order not to miss** the train.

(6) Modals for Opinion and Possibility

(should / must / have to)

◆ 1. SHOULD

Function:

We use **should** to give **opinions, advice, or recommendations**. It expresses what is **right, good, or expected** to do.

Structure:

Subject + **should** + base verb

Examples:

- You **should study** for the test.
- People **should respect** their parents.
- He **should see** a doctor.

Meaning: It is a **good idea** or **the right thing** to do, but not an obligation.

◆ 2. MUST

Function:

We use **must** to express **strong obligation, necessity, or certainty (strong opinion)**. It often shows that the speaker is **sure** about something.

Structure:

Subject + **must** + base verb

Examples:

- You **must wear** a seatbelt in the car. (obligation)
- She **must be tired** after that long trip. (strong opinion/certainty)
- Students **must arrive** on time.

Meaning: It's **very important** or the speaker is **certain** about something.

◆ 3. HAVE TO

Function:

We use **have to** for **rules, duties, or necessities** that come from **outside** (not the speaker's personal opinion).

Structure:

Subject + **have to** + base verb

(He/She/It → has to)

Examples:

- I **have to finish** my homework before dinner.
- She **has to wear** a uniform at school.
- We **have to leave** early to catch the bus.

Meaning: It's a **requirement** or **something necessary**.

Used for Stating Facts and Identity

◆ What is the Present Simple Tense?

The **Present Simple Tense** is used to talk about **facts, truths, routines**, and **things that are always true**.

It also describes **who someone is** or what something **is called or does** — in other words, **identity**.

◆ Structure

Subject + base verb (V1)

(For he/she/it → add **-s** or **-es** to the verb)

Subject	Verb Example	Sentence Example
I / You / We / They	play	I play football.
He / She / It	plays	She plays football.

◆ 1. Used for Stating Facts

We use the **Present Simple** to talk about things that are **always true** or **scientific facts**.

Examples:

- The sun **rises** in the east.
- Water **boils** at 100°C.
- Birds **fly** in the sky.
- The Earth **goes** around the sun.

✓ **Tip:** Facts do not change over time.

◆ 2. Used for Stating Identity

We use the **Present Simple** to tell **who someone is**, **what they do**, or **what something is**.

Examples:

• I am a teacher.	• They are students.
• He is my brother.	• This is my favorite book.
• She is from Canada.	

✓ **Tip:** When using **be** (am / is / are), it shows **identity or description**.
