Comparative adjectives are used to say how two things are different.

Form

-y	happy	happier	adjective - y + ier
-ow	shallow	shallower	adjective + er
consonant + vowel + consonant	big	bigger	double the final consonant of the adjective + er
many two-syllable adjectives all longer adjectives	boring interesting	more boring less interesting	more/less + adjective
irregular adjectives	good bad little	better worse less	

*Remember, always use 'than' before the second item being compared.

Summer is hotter **than** winter.

Maths is more difficult **than** English.

If it is clear what is being compared, there is no need to use 'than'.

I like winter, but I think summer is nicer.

Maths is difficult. I like English because it is easier.

Some adjectives have two possible forms of comparison (-er and more).

adjective	comparative form
clever	clever / more clever
common	commoner / more common
likely	likelier / more likely
pleasant	pleasanter / more pleasant
polite	politer / more polite

Uses/Functions

To add emphasis, use '*much / a lot more*' + *adjective* + '*than*'.

Summer is ***much hotter than*** winter.

Cars are ***a lot more expensive than*** bicycles.

I felt ***much better*** today ***than*** I did yesterday.

To show that two things are equal, use '*as*' + *adjective* + '*as*'.

My bike is ***as good as*** his bike.

I am ***as fast as*** you.

This restaurant is ***as good as*** any other.

To show one thing is inferior to another, use '*not as*' + *adjective* + *as*.

Spain is ***not as hot as*** the UAE in summer.

Copper is ***not as expensive as*** diamonds.

My brother is ***not as tall as*** me.

I am at school (now).

I usually wake up at 6 o'clock.

Water boils at 100 degrees Celsius.

For negative sentences, we can contract do not/does not.

I **don't** work.

It **doesn't** work.

Remember there are spelling changes for some verbs when using *he/she/it*. For example:

I study English.

He studies English.

There are also irregular verbs such as have/has, do/does, and go/goes.

I go to school.

She goes to school.

The sun rises in the east and sets in the west.

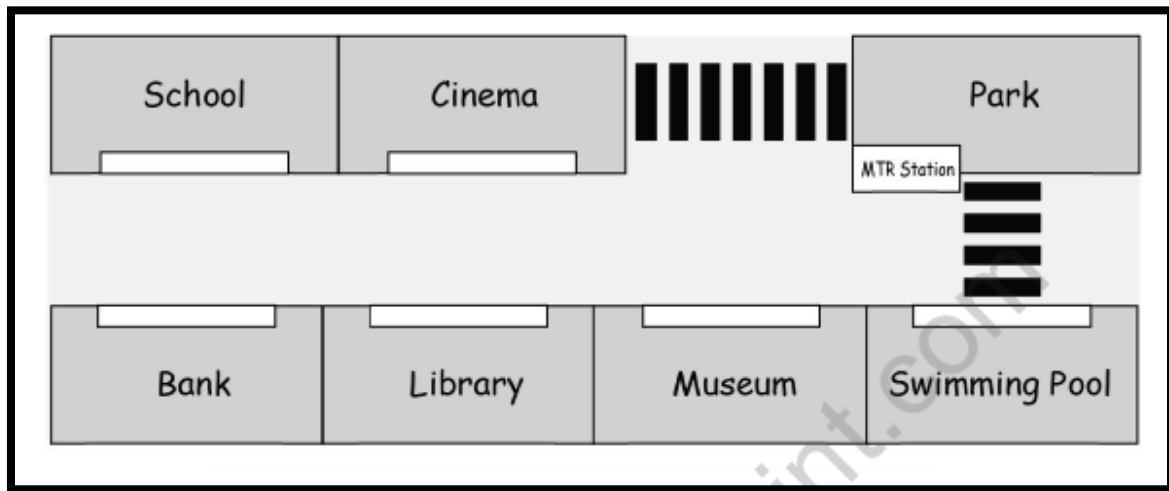

The World's First Modern Shopping Mall

The country in the world with perhaps the most malls, and also some of the biggest malls, is America. Edina, Minnesota, is the site of the first modern mall. It's still standing, and it's called Southdale Center. This was the first mall to offer a completely enclosed retail shopping experience.

Malls up to that point in time were modeled after the traditional European arcade. An arcade is a semi-covered walkway with shops on both sides. Examples of these arcades can be found today in Italy and Germany.

Southdale Center was actually going to be a new version of the traditional European arcade, surrounded by apartments, schools, and facilities that provide medical and emergency services. But then the plans changed completely. The developer of the shopping center, Dayton Company, and its designer and architect, Victor Gruen, saw a much bigger opportunity. They ultimately decided that Southdale Center was going to be different; it was going to be inside a big building. The mall opened in 1956, and it was the first fully enclosed climate-controlled retail space with multiple shops. This was so the day would feel much longer for people in the mall. This was supposed to encourage these shoppers to stay longer and buy more things.

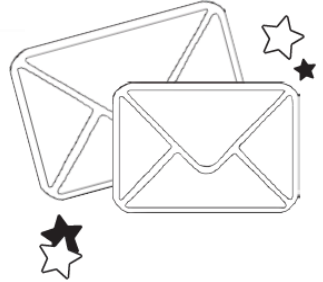
