What is a critical essay?

A critical essay is a careful analysis and evaluation of an article, research paper, or book, aiming to provide a balanced judgment supported by evidence.

Step 1: read the original text



1 Between 2001 and 2009, swimmer Michael Phelps broke 39 world records across a range of events. His astonishing achievements seemed unbeatable. Yet, only four of Phelps's world records still stand today. Can athletes continue to break world records like this?

2 A study in 2008 suggested that major improvements in athletic performance were behind us. After reviewing 40,000 races from 1896 to 2008, author Geoffroy Berthelot, claimed that athletic performance hit its **peak** in 1988. Yet, over 30 years later, records of speed, strength, and **endurance**, including Phelps's, continue to be broken. And although training, hard work, and motivation are all important, the source of their success mainly results from the many genes that control how their bodies are shaped and behave.

3 We are all born with different body shapes, and specific body shapes and sizes are ideally suited to different sports. For example, the ideal body shape for swimming is in the shape of a triangle, with big shoulders, a long torso¹ and narrow hips. Phelps was born with this body shape and improved it with training. His narrow hips result in less **resistance** as he moves through the water. Other sports require different body types. For example, long-distance runners are typically light with long, thin legs and short torsos, like the Kalenjin people of Kenya. Their body type has changed over history to help them to stay cool in a hot, dry climate. Today, that also helps them **dominate** long-distance running.

4 Different sports make specific demands on the muscles. There are two types of muscle fibres² and everyone is born with a different **distribution** of these muscle fibres. Athletes with more fast-twitch muscle fibres are better suited to sports such as sprinting³, diving, and weightlifting, which require quick, **explosive** energy. Those with more slow-twitch muscle fibres are better suited to endurance sports.

5 Another **crucial** factor in athletic success is how the body uses oxygen. VO₂ max measures how much oxygen your body can **absorb** and use. It is the key to success in many sports, especially cycling, which depends on lung power. Here too, genes can play a role. Oxygen is carried by red blood cells, and the production of red blood cells is **stimulated** by a chemical called EPO. Some people have a naturally stronger response to EPO than others.

6 Most scientists agree that the role of genes is crucial and in some cases, perhaps more important than how hard an athlete works. Genetic analysis can reveal which athletes are best suited to which sports. It is possible that future champions—and future records—will be the result of identifying athletes with the perfect genetic **profile**.

2 The article's focus on body types and natural traits is helpful in understanding athletic success. It shows how different sports require different physical strengths. For example, Phelps's broad shoulders and narrow hips helped him move quickly through water. The article also explains that differences in muscle types help determine why some athletes excel in sprinting, while others are better suited for endurance sports. These points make the article interesting and informative, as it justifies how bodies are naturally suited to certain sports.

3 However, the article ignores some key factors. Phelps was successful not just because of his body but because of his hard work and mental strength. Training, discipline, and a strong mindset are also necessary for athletic success, yet the article does not discuss these in depth. This leaves out an important part of what makes an athlete great.

4 The article also overlooks the issue of fairness. If athletes were selected based on their genetics, sport might become less open to everyone, favouring only those with "ideal" bodies. This could be unfair as it ignores the effort and passion many athletes put into their training.

5 In conclusion, while "Born to Win" is an interesting article about the role of genes in athletic success, it does not give the full picture. Success in sport, or in life in general, is not only about natural ability but also about hard work and dedication. For sport to remain fair and open, we must recognise that both nature and effort matter.

However, Uber Eats is not without its weaknesses. One major drawback is the additional cost, as delivery fees and service charges can significantly increase the total price of an order. Another issue is that delivery times can sometimes be delayed, especially during busy hours, which may lead to customer dissatisfaction. Finally, the quality of the food may not always match the restaurant experience due to packaging or transportation issues.

Overall, Uber Eats is a highly effective and convenient food delivery project that fits well into modern lifestyles. I would recommend it to people who value convenience and variety, although it is best used occasionally due to the extra costs.

Grameen Bank is a well-known social enterprise founded in 1983 in Bangladesh by Muhammad Yunus. Its primary goal is to provide small loans, or microcredit, to individuals living in poverty who do not have access to traditional banking services. The organisation focuses particularly on empowering women by helping them start small businesses and become financially independent. Over the years, Grameen Bank has expanded its influence and inspired similar initiatives around the world. I first learned about this enterprise while studying social entrepreneurship in class, and I was impressed by how it combines financial services with social impact.

One of the greatest strengths of Grameen Bank is its commitment to financial inclusion. It gives opportunities to people who are often excluded from the formal banking system, allowing them to improve their economic situation. Another major strength is its strong social impact, as many borrowers use the loans to start small businesses, support their families, and increase their standard of living. Additionally, the organisation uses a group-based lending system, which encourages accountability and mutual support among members, increasing repayment success rates.

Despite its many advantages, Grameen Bank has some weaknesses. One issue is that borrowers may face difficulties repaying loans if their businesses do not succeed, which can create financial stress. Another drawback is that the loan amounts are usually small, which may limit opportunities for larger-scale business growth. Finally, some critics argue that microfinance alone cannot fully address the deeper causes of poverty without additional education and support systems.

Overall, Grameen Bank is a powerful and inspiring example of a social enterprise that creates real change in communities. I strongly recommend it as a model for addressing poverty, although it should be supported by other development programs for greater impact.
