A	Highdown Park The largest and most popular open space in the city, Highdown has many paths for keen walkers, as well as horse-riding and golf. The much-visited 19th-century glasshouses contain an interesting exhibition about birds from around the world.
B	Brock Park A beautiful park on the edge of the city, Brock Park attracts huge crowds. The open-air theatre has a programme of plays suitable for school groups. There is a well-used basketball court and baseball field, a children's playground and a café. Climb Harry's Hill to admire the beautiful fields and forests beyond the city.
C	Boscawen Park This small and peaceful park offers guided tours, given by the knowledgeable Environment Officers, and evening visitors to the park may be lucky enough to see rare frogs and bats. It is situated on the River Elton and can be reached in about 30 minutes from the city center by river taxi. There is a snack bar and gift shop.
D	Victoria Park This quiet park, on the edge of the city and easy to visit by public transport, has boats for hire on the lake, a skateboard park, basketball and tennis courts and a picnic area. Often seen in postcard views of the city, Victoria Park contains one of the oldest windmills in the country the museum should not be missed.
E	East Bank Park This is a tiny, little-known park in the heart of the city, with gardens filled with sculptures, trees and flowers. It makes a perfect resting place, popular with local artists, and is within minutes of the theatre and entertainment district.
F	Elmwood Park At Elmwood Park, there are walks on well-made paths and cycle rides for all abilities. Elmwood is just inside the city limit and has an area of quiet woodland which is home to deer and other animals. The visitor centre, numerous display boards and a fun quiz make this a positive learning experience for all ages.

A	This book is for travelers who have money to spend. Top-quality hotels are listed, as well as excellent restaurants, shops, theatres, and cinemas that stay open until very late at night. Color maps and photographs of Britain's most important city centres make it an attractive and useful publication.
B	If you would like to know more about Britain's history but are tired of museums, this book will take you on a tour of the British countryside, stopping at castles and historical sites. For keen walkers, there are suggested routes, but a car is necessary to reach the start of each one.
C	This author stays away from the main tourist centres, which are well covered in other books. He tells us instead about the many towns and villages which are usually forgotten but are certainly worth visiting. His suggested routes avoiding the noisy motorways give a wonderful opportunity to drive through the beautiful countryside.
D	The author covers the history of a number of important British cities and also provides practical information about each one, including names of inexpensive hotels. The train and bus information may go out of date very quickly, but phone numbers are provided so routes can be checked.
E	This book contains 100 walks through fields and forests in different parts of the country. Every walk starts from a town or city, and some walks can be completed in a day. On other walks, you need to stay somewhere overnight. However, suggestions of inexpensive places to stay on the routes are included, as well as information about where to eat and public transport.

Unusually, it includes not just the main cities but also suggests visiting smaller towns whose museums and art galleries contain valuable collections. Or going to dangerous places like the Amazon Rainforest or extreme environments- with a click of a button while you are sitting in your classroom.

It won't be long before we use VR for online shopping and businesses use it to advertise for their products. Nowadays. When we buy things online, we can only see photos of products, but with VR devices we will be able to tour virtual shops and even touch the products we are interested in! But that's not all. Have you ever been disappointed by a holiday you booked online? Well, in future you will be able to take a virtual tour of your accommodation before you make any decisions! There is simply no limit to the ways we will be able to use Virtual Reality.

As advanced VR equipment becomes more affordable, it's going to reach more and more people. It will change the way we live, work and play forever! Virtual Reality is going to completely change the way we see our world and we will even be able to control reality for our own benefit.

Peer Pressure

Peer pressure is when you think you should do something because other people your age say you should, or because everyone else is doing it, too. This could mean wearing certain clothes, or maybe smoking, or even skipping school. Sometimes people do things because they want to be liked, or they worry that they'll get teased if they don't follow the crowd. Peer pressure can indeed be challenging, especially during adolescence when the desire to fit in is strong. It's normal to want to fit in with everyone else, but in the end people will think you're a lot cooler if you learn to make your own decisions.

What to look out for:

- When people try to get you to do or try something, they might say 'everyone else is doing it, so why aren't you?'
- If you don't want to do something but you do it anyway, you'll probably regret it.
- Nobody should be made to do anything they don't want to.

Are you feeling peer pressure?

- It's hard if you're the only one saying no to something, but be brave.
- Knowing the facts about certain behaviors or activities can help you to make informed decisions. Understanding the possible outcomes of actions can help you resist pressure more effectively.
- If your friends want you to do something and you're not sure, ask yourself how you really feel about it and stick to what you believe. When you believe in yourself and your values, you're more likely to make decisions that support your principles.
- If you say no to something, real friends should respect your decision. If they don't, maybe you need to find new friends. Surround yourself with friends who share your values and interests. Having a supportive social circle can reduce the likelihood of giving in to negative peer pressure.
- It's better to have a few friends who want the best for you than lots of friends who try and make you do things you don't want to do.
- Learn to express your thoughts and opinions confidently. Saying "no" doesn't mean you have to be challenging, but being confident allows you to stand firm in your decisions.

Is a friend of yours feeling peer pressure?

- If your friend doesn't want to do something either, back them up by saying no, too. This can really help them and it'll make peer pressure easier to resist.
- Help them make their own choices - they will gain confidence.
- Be careful not to put pressure on your friends.

Welcome to Sky Mobile, one of the fastest-growing mobile phone networks in the UK. You can go almost anywhere in the UK and use your Sky phone. Our service now reaches up to 85% of the UK population. With Sky Mobile, you have total freedom to talk, take messages or send a text message practically anywhere, at any time.

In a recent questionnaire about mobile phone networks, people voted Sky Mobile the top service provider in the country. We take our customers seriously and intend to ensure that everyone receives the service they expect.

The easiest way to buy talk time on your phone is by credit card. If you haven't done so already, please let us know which card you'll be using. Then, whenever you need talk time, call 440, free of charge, and tell us the amount you want to buy. If you do not want to use your credit card, vouchers are available from many stores.

You can also send text messages with Sky phones. These are a quick and inexpensive way to contact friends. They are perfect for when talking is difficult, when the music is too loud or when you want to keep something private. Sending a message costs as little as 5 pence but receiving one is free.

Sky Mobile also provides an information service for its mobile phone users. This service gives you recorded information, 24 hours a day, on sport (all the news, plus the day's football and rugby results), weather and finance. Just call 166 from your Sky phone. Calls cost 20 pence per minute at all times and are charged by the second. With Sky phone, you can also receive text messages to remind you of important dates. When you register with Sky Mobile, you should enter your diary dates, for example friends' birthdays, into a personal calendar. You will then receive a text message, with plenty of time to spare, as a reminder.

The answerphone service provided by Sky Mobile includes a facility for you to record a message. It's also possible to change your message whenever you like, so you can let people know exactly what you're doing. To record a message on your Sky answerphone, just dial 234 and follow the instructions.

When callers have left messages, it costs just 10 pence per minute to hear them. The cost of a call depends on the time of day that you make it. It is normally cheaper to make calls between 6.00 p.m. and 6.00 a.m. However, with Sky Mobile, it is possible to choose a different period. You have the choice of morning hours (7.00 am to 11.00 am); lunchtime (11.00 am to 3.00 pm); or afternoon (3.00 pm to 7.00 pm).

Peer Pressure

Peer pressure is when you think you should do something because other people your age say you should, or because everyone else is doing it, too. This could mean wearing certain clothes, or maybe smoking, or even skipping school. Sometimes people do things because they want to be liked, or they worry that they'll get teased if they don't follow the crowd. Peer pressure can indeed be challenging, especially during adolescence when the desire to fit in is strong. It's normal to want to fit in with everyone else, but in the end people will think you're a lot cooler if you learn to make your own decisions.

What to look out for:

- When people try to get you to do or try something, they might say 'everyone else is doing it, so why aren't you?'
- If you don't want to do something but you do it anyway, you'll probably regret it.
- Nobody should be made to do anything they don't want to.

Are you feeling peer pressure?

- It's hard if you're the only one saying no to something, but be brave.
- Knowing the facts about certain behaviors or activities can help you to make informed decisions. Understanding the possible outcomes of actions can help you resist pressure more effectively.
- If your friends want you to do something and you're not sure, ask yourself how you really feel about it and stick to what you believe. When you believe in yourself and your values, you're more likely to make decisions that support your principles.
- If you say no to something, real friends should respect your decision. If they don't, maybe you need to find new friends. Surround yourself with friends who share your values and interests. Having a supportive social circle can reduce the likelihood of giving in to negative peer pressure.
- It's better to have a few friends who want the best for you than lots of friends who try and make you do things you don't want to do.
- Learn to express your thoughts and opinions confidently. Saying "no" doesn't mean you have to be challenging, but being confident allows you to stand firm in your decisions.

Is a friend of yours feeling peer pressure?

- If your friend doesn't want to do something either, back them up by saying no, too. This can really help them and it'll make peer pressure easier to resist.
- Help them make their own choices - they will gain confidence.
- Be careful not to put pressure on your friends.

The easiest way to buy talk time on your phone is by credit card. If you haven't done so already, please let us know which card you'll be using. Then, whenever you need talk time, call 440, free of charge, and tell us the amount you want to buy. If you do not want to use your credit card, vouchers are available from many stores.

You can also send text messages with Sky phones. These are a quick and inexpensive way to contact friends. They are perfect for when talking is difficult, when the music is too loud or when you want to keep something private. Sending a message costs as little as 5 pence but receiving one is free.

Sky Mobile also provides an information service for its mobile phone users. This service gives you recorded information, 24 hours a day, on sport (all the news, plus the day's football and rugby results), weather and finance. Just call 166 from your Sky phone. Calls cost 20 pence per minute at all times and are charged by the second. With Sky phone, you can also receive text messages to remind you of important dates.
