Going to the National Park

We are naturally very proud of our national park and want you to enjoy it as much as possible. However, when you come to the park you are asked to remember that it is a very valuable and sensitive natural environment and so must not be damaged in any way. Please follow the rules to ensure you have a safe and pleasant visit, and try to leave everything as you find it, as others have done previously.



When you plan your visit, make sure that you pack everything you will need during your stay. The park is a nature reserve and there are no shops selling food and drink! You should also bring a pocket knife and a set of basic tools if you are using mountain bikes, because the emergency service is not prepared to help people every time they have a flat tyre. Do make sure you have clear, up-to-date maps of the whole park, and a compass. Someone in your group should know how to deal with maps and have some experience of travelling in the country.

When you first arrive you must fill in a registration form and hand it in to the guard on duty. He will give you an emergency number to phone in case of accident, or if you find an injured animal or bird. You must only use this number when necessary, calls for less serious matters will result in a charge to be paid before leaving the park. The guard will also advise you as to expected weather conditions, and will reserve the right to refuse entry to the park if exceptionally bad weather is forecast.

While you are in the park you may follow any of the paths and tracks marked with a blue or red sign, but the green and yellow trails are only for groups with professional guides or visitors with a park training certificate. Please do not use unofficial boats on ponds and lakes, and do not climb trees. Campers are requested to put their tents in the camping areas indicated on the map and to leave these exactly as they find them. Obviously, no rubbish may be left anywhere: a guard seeing visitors dropping litter will escort them from the camp. Picnics are allowed, but do not give any food to any animals.

On leaving the park you are asked to inform the guard of your departure. There is a souvenir shop and visitor centre at the main north entrance, and here we have also built a children's centre where you can feed the squirrels and ducks and play in the mud!

Your story must be your own work, between 2,000 and 2,500 words and typed, double-spaced, on one side only of each sheet of paper.

Even if you're in danger of missing the closing date, we are unable to accept stories by fax or email. You must include the application form with your story. Unfortunately, your story cannot be returned, nor can we discuss our decisions.

The story must not have appeared in print or in recorded form, for example on radio or TV, anywhere in the world.

Climbing a mountain requires a lot of experience and skill. I had been practicing on smaller mountains for a whole season. I used special equipment such as ropes and axes.

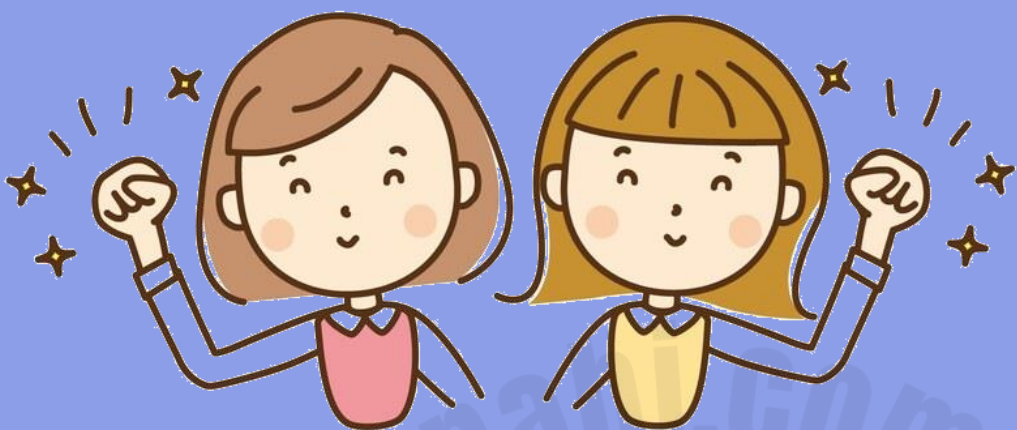
There were some challenges I had to encounter. The weather on mountains is not stable. As you go higher the temperature can drop below zero and of course oxygen gets thinner.
