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



rescue	<p>Verb - present participle rescuing   past tense and past participle rescued uk /'res-kju:/ to save someone or something from a dangerous situation (يُنقذ) <b>EX:</b> Fifty passengers had to be <b>rescued</b> from a sinking ship.</p>	
picnic	<p>noun uk /'pɪk-nɪk/ food that you take from your home to eat outside (نَزَهة ) <b>EX:</b> We're going to have a <b>picnic</b> down by the lake.</p>	
anxious	<p>adjective uk /'æŋk-ʃəs/ worried and very nervous (قلق / مُتوتر ) <b>EX:</b> She's very <b>anxious</b> about her exams.</p>	
pirate	<p>noun uk /'paɪə-rət/ someone who attacks ships and steals from them (فرسان ) <b>EX:</b> There are no longer <b>pirate</b> these days.</p>	
ghost	<p>noun uk /gəʊst/ a dead person's spirit, which some people believe they can see (شبح ) <b>EX:</b> Do you believe in <b>ghosts</b>?</p>	
massive	<p>adjective uk /'mæs-ɪv/ very big (هائل / ضخم ) <b>EX:</b> A <b>massive</b> building was collapsed.</p>	
surrounded	<p>verb uk /sə'raʊnd/ to be or go everywhere around something or someone (يحيط ) <b>EX:</b> The children <b>surrounded</b> their grandfather to hear him telling a story.</p>	
torches	<p>noun uk /tɔ:tʃ/ a long stick with material that burns tied to the top of it (شعلة ) <b>EX:</b> When we camped, we use <b>torch</b> at night to frighten the wild animals.</p>

crack	verb uk /kræk/ to break something so that thin lines appear on its surface, or to become broken in this way ( <u>يشقّ / يتصدّع</u> ) <b>EX:</b> The earth surface has <b>cracked</b> due to an earthquake.	
colossal	adjective uk /kə'lɒs.əl/ extremely large ( <u>ضخم</u> ) <b>EX:</b> The creature was really <b>colossal</b> .	
tentacle	noun us /'ten-ta-kəl/ a long, thin, arm of some sea animals, such as the octopus and jellyfish ( <u>أذرع الأخطبوط</u> ) <b>EX:</b> The octopus' <b>tentacles</b> were huge.	
smash	verb uk /smæʃ/ to break into a lot of pieces or to make something do this with a loud noise ( <u>يُهشم</u> ) <b>EX:</b> Someone had <b>smashed</b> the shop window.



lifestyle	noun uk /'laɪf.staɪl/ the way that you live (أَسْلُوب حَيَاة) <b>EX:</b> She has a very unhealthy <u>lifestyle</u> .	
physical	adjective uk /'fɪz.i.kəl/ relating to the body (جَسَدِي) <b>EX:</b> There was nothing unusual about her <u>physical</u> appearance.	

mental	<p>adjective uk /'men·təl/ relating to the mind (عُقْلٌ / ذُهْنٌ) <b>EX:</b> The family has a history of <b>mental</b> disorder.</p>

spend	<p>verb -past tense and past participle spent uk /spend/ to use time doing something or being somewhere (يَقْضِي وَقْتاً) <b>EX:</b> He's planning to <b>spend</b> some time at home with his family.</p>	
relax	<p>verb uk /rɪ'læks/ to become happy and comfortable because nothing is worrying you, or to make someone do this (يَسْتَرْخِي) <b>EX:</b> I find it difficult to <b>relax</b>.</p>	
busy	<p>adjective - comparative busier   superlative busiest uk /'bɪz-i/ working hard, or giving your attention to a particular activity (مشغول) <b>EX:</b> I've got plenty of jobs to keep you <b>busy</b>.</p>
